Resident calls for security answered

Over £150,000 of security improvements will combat anti-social behaviour and the fear of crime for residents of Immingham's flats.

During consultation with the local tenant and resident association and the Immingham Partnership, residents raised concerns about anti-social behaviour and damage to property.

Now residents will benefit from improvements that have provided secure fencing and gating around the flats.

Shoreline has also provided additional fencing to alleyways in the neighbourhood to prevent people cutting through the area and causing spontaneous acts of anti-social behaviour.

Shoreline regeneration officer Christina Letter said: "The residents are delighted with the new fencing – people feel safer and more secure in their own homes and their property and areas around their homes have more protection.

"This is the first of a number of security investments to the flats and we will continue to work with residents to improve the area."

The improvements form part of Shoreline's commitment to the transformation of neighbourhoods and the appearance of estates.

Shoreline recently announced over two million pounds of security and environmental investment to combat anti-social behaviour and improve the appearance of Grimsby's East Marsh multi-storey blocks.
